

Gamelan is the name for the indigenous percussion ensemble of Java, Bali and other parts of Indonesia. It consists of a basic group of metalophones (xylophones) and gongs tuned in the unique non-western scales of <u>slendro</u> and <u>pelog</u>. To these instruments may be added drums, voices, flutes and strings.

There are currently a little over a hundred sets of gamelan instruments in America, mostly based at academic institutions. Americans have also been performing and composing for gamelan instruments for several decades. Gamelan Son of Lion ensemble focuses on new music development using gamelan instruments. The ensemble is based in Manhattan and gives regular concerts both there and in Rockland County, as well as touring through the northeast. The instruments of Son of Lion were made by composer-ethnomusicologist Barbara Benary.

Tonight's program also includes $\frac{\text{wayang kulit}}{\text{puppets of Javanese}}$ and American origin.
