DAVID SIMONS

David Simons composes music for theater, dance, film, installations, and concert ensembles. His unusual collection of sounds from self-built and non-European instruments combines with digital sampling technologies to create a unique pan-cultural music. He has devised his own method of using the Theremin as a Midi controller. A graduate of the California Institute of the Arts, he studied composition with Earle Brown, Morton Subotnick, James Tenney, Harold Budd; percussion teachers include John Bergamo (Cal Arts), Paul Price (Manhattan School Of Music), and **Alan Dawson** (Berklee). David has researched and performed music from many of the world's cultures, and furthered his music studies in Bali, Bangkok and Seoul. He has toured internationally many times. For many years he has been a member of Gamelan Son of Lion and Music for Homemade Instruments in New York, and compositions of his appear on a number of the CDs of both ensembles. Mr. Simons is a resident of Chestnut Ridge, NY.

GONGing Ceremony was conceived as an outdoor event centering on the use of a great many of the gamelan's knobbed gongs from Java, plus a selection of other gamelan instruments. The gongs play repeated fragments in a unique fashion involving damping some of the notes with the legs. This is the premier performance. The work is in development and will later include dance, costumes and kites.

TJOKORDA GDE ARSA ARTHA

Our guest dancer was born in Ubud, Bali and has been a Rockland County creative presence for over a dozen years. In addition to his dance performance and work as a visual artist and master pumpkin carver, Gde is Director of the Pomona Cultural Center, and teaches Balinese dance and theatrical arts at Bard College.
